Common names: Eng: yeheb nut.

Ecology: An evergreen shrub of semi-arid bushland in the Horn of

Africa, south-eastern Ethiopia and Somalia, extending to the coast where it grows in semi-arid bushland. **It** has **been** introduced in Tanzania, especially in dry areas, as it is drought resistant. Roots go deep to underground water

sources.

Uses: Firewood, food (seeds), fodder (leaves), bee forage, mulch,

soil conservation, nitrogen fixation, live fence, dye (red,

from leaves), tannin.

Description: A stiff erect evergreen shrub or small tree, usually about 2

m, rarely 4 m. LEAVES: leathery, compound, **1-6 pairs leaflets**, each to 3 cm, underside **covered with red glands**. FLOWERS: buds glandular, **5 yellow petals**, over 4 cm long. FRUIT: **pods**, **4-6 cm** with **thin upturned beak**. Inside **1-4 flat, oval seeds**, the "nuts", each 2-4 cm long.

Seedlings, direct sowing, cuttings, self-seeding when

established.

Seed info.: No. of seeds per kg: about 300. Good germination.

treatment: Immerse in hot water (75-80°C), allow to cool and soak for

12 hours.

storage: seeds are susceptible to insect attack and so should not be

stored for long.

Management: Slow growing during the initial stages while establishing

its massive root system. Young seedlings develop a strong

taproot before shoots.

Remarks: The fruits are eaten by livestock, birds and wild animals.

They can be dried and have a high food value.
