| Ecology:            | A large tree widely distributed in Africa. There are several subspecies occurring from sea level to 2,100 m. It prefers moist soils with a high watertable beside rivers, but will also grow in open woodland. Common in the Impenetrable (Bwindi) forest.   |
| Uses:               | Firewood, charcoal, poles, timber (furniture, general construction, tool handles, carving), food (fruit), bee forage, medicine (bark, roots, leaves), dyes, tannin (bark).   |
| Description:        | A densely leafy forest tree, usually 10-15 m but up to 25 m, the trunk broad<br>and fluted and the crown rounded and heavy, the branchlets drooping, the<br>stems thick and angular. BARK: smooth when young, black and rough with<br>age, flaking, producing a red watery sap if cut. LEAVES: young leaves<br>purple-red, but mature leaves dark green, <b>opposite</b> , <b>shiny and smooth on</b><br><b>both surfaces</b> , <b>the tip long but rounded</b> , on a <b>short grooved stalk</b> . The<br>leaves are variable in shape. FLOWERS: white, showy stamens, in dense<br>branched heads 10 cm across, the <b>honey-sweet smell</b> attracting many<br>insects; <b>stalks angular</b> , <b>square</b> . FRUIT: oval to 3 cm, purple-black and<br>shiny, one-seeded, in big bunches of 20-30. |
| Propagation:        | Seedlings (sow seed in pots), wildings, direct sowing on site.   |
| Seed:<br>treatment: | Good germination. No. of seeds per kg: 2,400-3,700. not necessary.   |
| storage:            | must be stored immediately the fruit is picked. Seeds may be spoilt in less than 24 hours.   |
| Management:         | Pollarding, coppicing.   |
| Remarks:            | The wood is brown, hard and strong. It is easily worked but liable to split.   |
